Following the 1st Cultural Workshop held in Taipei last year, the 2nd Cultural Workshop will be held at the University of Tokyo on the 20th and 21st of October, 2000. The main theme of the workshop is "Postmodernism, its Conditions and Problems in Asia."

Since the word and idea of "postmodernism" was first proposed to describe the state of the current global historical condition. The term "postmodernism" has become of the most popular cultural currencies these days, especially (and naturally) in those countries, areas and regions which regards themselves either as having already fully achieved "modernization" or as having somehow surpassed "modernity." By taking stock of the problems and validity of postmodernism as the concept stands in different areas of East Asia, the present workshop will try to shed light on some of the fundamental issues we have in common in East Asia in our transactions with this Western idea.
